Overview:

Although sometimes referred to as *practice* change, agricultural extension has conventionally focused on individuals' decisions and behaviours, even if such individuals are understood in the context of wider systems. Such an approach usefully emphasises the uniqueness and context-specificity of every farming member. Yet, it also risks obscuring the common social aspect – the deeper, shared character - of some of the core activities that any individual partakes in. In an effort to avoid such reductionism, resultant efforts often tip too far the *other* way to focus instead on structural elements that individuals seem to have little control over.

A potential way around this conundrum is offered by social practice theory (SPT). Used in numerous other fields (e.g. public health, sustainability), SPT offers an analytically and practically useful way of working with individuals without atomising them. Practices refer to the basic activities that make up society and specific ways of going about them. Emerging from the intersection of materials, skills and meanings, practices are dynamic, recognisable and deliberate activities such as cooling, reporting, directing, and caring. Resonant with but distinct from existing work in the agricultural extension literature, a SPT approach highlights more of the physical, social, and tacit aspects of everyday life and work than normally accounted for in typical behaviourist frameworks. It also suggests a range of new possible intervention points for those wanting to shift practices, such as adding new meanings or elements to existing practices, reviving lost practices, combining or synchronising them in new ways, or developing entirely new ones (eg "adapting to climate change").

This workshop will explore the potential of using SPT to rethink the practice side of agricultural practice change. It will introduce participants to SPT in order to explore together the possible insights the framework may (or may not) offer the agricultural extension community.
