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APEN Conference Wrap-Up

The 2015 APEN Conference was held in Adelaide on November 10 -12 and delved into all things extension. This year's theme dealt with the ever shrinking world of extension and the increased use of technology and tools such as social media.

180 delegates from across Australia, New Zealand, as well as parts of Asia and Europe descended into sunny Adelaide for 3 days of thought provoking and inspirational presentations with themes such as Monitoring and Evaluation, Change and Innovation, Partnerships and Relationships and New Technology.

This year the APEN conference held their field trip at the beginning of the conference and delegates were treated to field day in the productive food bowl of the Adelaide Hills and learned about the recent Sampson Flat Fires that hit the region in January of this year. Delegates were able to look at the fire scare (pictured above) and talk to local landholder Keith Freegard about his bushfire experience. Delegates then visited the 2014 "Grower of the Year" Robert Green.

Whilst some delegates were enjoying the Adelaide hills other delegates attended a

Social Media workshop.

On Wednesday the more formal proceedings took place and the conference was officially opened with Jeanette Long making her inaugural address as APEN President to conference delegates.

Gavin Beever (Managing Consultant, ORM) was the first in a successful line of passionate and inspiring guest speakers including, Jeff Coutts (Director, Coutts J & R), Chris Reichstein (Nuffield Scholar and Grain Producer), Jane Weatherley (General Manager, Livestock Productivity, MLA), and Rod Saal OAM (Principle, Ag Assist) with the speakers encouraging us to 'aim for the sky'.

The sessions were varied and diverse such as:

- Reducing on-farm emissions: successful farmer engagement by understanding the impact on productivity and profitability – Donna Lucas
- Filling the innovation gap: Dairy Industry responses to the loss of government extension services – Neil Webster

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APEN ETA Sub-Committee Conference Workshop Summary

The APEN conference this year was the perfect platform for the Extension, Training and Accreditation (ETA) sub-committee to hold its first workshop. The sub-committee has been in operation since late 2013 and has members from the tertiary, public and private sectors who aim to improve current extension education and training on offer for both students and professionals. Sub-committee members have identified a collective need to redefine and reinvigorate extension and have collaborated on a paper that outlines this stance (Ampt et al, forthcoming in REIS).

The workshop session was mediated by ETA sub-committee members Bruce Howie (Managing Director, C-Qual Agritelligence), Rebecca Cross (Postdoctoral researcher, Sydney University) and Ruth Nettle (Associate Professor, Melbourne University), with contributions from Peter Ampt (Lecturer, Sydney University) and Helen Ross (Professor, Queensland University) who were unable to attend.

Three papers were presented to frame the sub-committee's approach, with a final discussion session to generate feedback from the audience. The first paper was delivered by Rebecca Cross and Ruth Nettle on the state of Australian tertiary extension education. It highlighted the lack of cohesion and ad hoc approach to including extension-related 'people-skills' into agricultural and environmental degree programs (if at all), and the consequent necessity for graduates to learn these skills on-the-job. Ruth discussed the expansion of extension-related education at Melbourne University, while Rebecca described the rationale behind the first course on extension to be reinstated at Sydney University in over two decades.

Bruce Howie then delivered a very frank presentation on the role of private providers in catering to training needs. He addressed the skill-gap evident in the extension profession and argued for a collaborative approach to help tailor training to meet this need. Bruce also noted current trends in learning within the professional development field highlighting the shift from structured course modules to independent, workplace learning. Social and collaboration tools are increasingly facilitating personal learning networks and curated learning opportunities.

Helen Ross was unavailable to attend and so Rebecca Cross presented the paper 'reinvigorating extension' on her behalf. This paper summed up the need for a more integrative, innovative, creative and participatory extension approach to dealing with increasingly complex, 'wicked', global problems. It concluded with questions on how this reinvigoration could be instigated via education and training, which led the session into a group thinktank on how this should/could be done.

Attendees were split into small groups to distil recommendations and report back. The main message resounding from these discussions was the need for all graduates to have these 'life-skills' embedded in their education at all levels, and the need for more formal collaboration between the tertiary sector and the extension profession. The level of involvement and enthusiasm of attendees at this session emphasised the need for a longer, more detailed session in the future to better nut-out these ideas and generate useable feedback to influence current education and training programs.

The conference ended with a highly entertaining and humorous debate moderated by Ian Doyle on *Public vs private extension: Who does it better?* with four public and four private participants to argue

the merit of both sides.

Both provided a keynote speaker (Gavin Beever and Jane Weatherley respectively) and GRDC's Pru Cook contributed her social media skills to the pre-conference workshop along with private consultants Cynthia Mahoney and Greg Mills.

The logos of all the sponsors were seen often throughout the conference and it was great to have the sponsors' representatives there as delegates and also being actively involved; chairing sessions, leading the field trip and being the MC for our Awards Dinner (thank you Taryn) and helping present the APEN Awards (thank you Neil).

We now turn our attention and look forward to the International APEN Conference in Northern Queensland in 2017.

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APEN Amabel Fulton Award for Excellence in Extension for a Young Professional

The APEN Awards for Excellence in Extension for an Experienced Professional and for a Young Professional were first introduced by the APEN Management Committee for the 1999 Conference held in Perth. Amabel Fulton was on that management committee and had the orginal idea. She set up the selection criteria for applications to address. They are:

- The use or development of extension principles in the work.
- · Evidence of the effectiveness and efficiency of the work.
- The applicability of the work in the broader practice of extension.

Amabel had a passion for extension and especially for young extension professionals and ran a number of leadership workshops in conjunction with APEN. The 2009 APEN Management Committee decided to rename the Young Professional award to the APEN Amabel Fulton Award in her honour. Sadly, Amabel lost her battle with breast cancer shortly before the first award was presented at the 2009 International Conference in Busselton, WA.

The selection panel gave **Robbie Commens** the top score because the program he has designed and delivered for the Macadamia industry has a strong 'route to change',

and there is good evidence of the effectiveness of his approach in the 5 year period of his work. In particular the strength of his program has been achieved by engaging key influencers in the macadamia industry and using their influence and relationships with growers, brokering industry agreed messages around best practice, use of technology and a focus on targeted key messages at the right times. The Twenty-First Annual General Meeting of the Australasia-Pacific Extension Network (Inc) was held during the 2015 APEN Conference at Hotel Grand Chancellor on Hindley, Adelaide on Wednesday 11th November, 2015 starting at 4.20pm.

Jeanette Long, APEN President, welcomed everyone to the 2015 APEN AGM and to Adelaide. There were 33 people at the AGM; one from New South Wales, one from Northern Territory, seven from New Zealand, seven from Queensland, five from South Australia, two from Tasmania, seven from Victoria (including one by telephone) and three from Western Australia. There were 177 delegates at the conference.

APEN has continued to stay in contact with the Global Forum for Rural Advisory Services through Roy Murray-Prior's involvement and we will be partnering with them for the 2017 conference. The 2017 Conference Convenor, Lawrence di Bella from Ingham, attended the annual GFRAS meeting and was able to discuss plans and needs with GFRAS management. We are looking forward to many international visitors for that conference.

Social Media Sub-committee

This group includes dedicated members Cynthia Mahoney and Justine Severin who along with MC members Rebecca, Warren, Greg, Graham and Roe met early in the twelve months to plan how to increase APEN's activity in social media.

As a result of their input APEN's social media has been ramped up this year, many thanks to Rebecca Wallis for her efforts with Twitter and Cynthia Mahoney for her time with Facebook. LinkedIn groups are also operating – so take the opportunity to connect with and share through social media.

Achievements

Communication

ExtensionNet had one edition in the last 12 months, there has been considerable effort going on in the background by the Editor Maryse Bourgault to develop an electronic version of the magazine through the APEN website. Our aim will be to produce 2-3 electronic versions each year with one hardcopy being posted to all members following the AGM.

Our electronic eBulletin has been sent to all members on a monthly basis keeping them up to date with extension activities and issues as well as training courses, conferences and positions vacant. The Reading Brace provided each month

by Mike Weise, Victorian Regional Coordinator, has also helped to keep people up to date with publications.

Mentoring Scheme

The mentoring scheme has been operating again this year. Many thanks to Peter Hanrahan who is coordinating the scheme with Roe and to our mentors for donating their time to develop emerging professionals.

This year a total of nine pairs have participated in the program which is now drawing to a close. The scheme provides professional development to mentees and mentors alike and there is more information available on the website.

Webinars

Many thanks to Leanne Issacson for running our Webinars this year. Our aim is to provide professional development for all of our members from their office.

During the first webinar Leanne provided members with an overview of how to use Linked In as an effective business and networking tool. About 30 people attended.

The second webinar focused on using Twitter and live steaming as an extension tool. Leanne was joined by Tom Whitty from MLA and Lela Prez from Texas involved in agchat foundation in US. There were about 45 participants.

We plan to hold another webinar in December, so watch the eBulletin and our social media for details.

Member survey

The member survey was carried out this year with 63 respondents representing 13% of the 476 APEN members.

The results of the survey will assist the MC in developing plans for the coming two years. The results indicate there is a strong satisfaction with APEN as a networking organisation and a belief that it is well managed and effective. There is also a good level of satisfaction with how APEN addresses professional development however there was a deal of uncertainty with the way APEN addresses policy and advocacy.

Regional Activities

In 2014/15 regional activities have occurred in Tasmania and New Zealand. In March Sophie Folder and Aysha Fleming (theCluster Coordinator) coordinated a Facilitation Skills Workshop which was held in Launceston which I delivered to over 20 participants. This came about after an earlier networking meeting held during November last year where they decided to run the workshop.

Denise Bewsell worked with Greg Mills to coordinate him delivering his Value Base Messaging workshop in Lincoln and in Wellington. The second of these being kindly supported by Beef and Lamb NZ. The workshops were well supported with approximately 30 people taking the time to participate.

APEN Award for Excellence in Extension for an Experienced Professional:

The selection panel has awarded **Simon Sankey** the 2015 APEN Award for Excellence in Extension for an Experienced Professional for the scale of his influence in extension in the dairy industry in New Zealand. This is exemplified by the role that Simon played in re-casting the fundamental approach to DairyNZ's core activity — Consulting Officer led discussion groups (in the move to Whole Farm Assessments), and his focus and energy in supporting other extension professionals through training and mentoring. The praise from his colleges in the application was very strong and it is very clear that Simon is a great mentor to his extension colleges, young and old. New Zealand dairy would be a different industry without Simon's contribution. Congratulations Simon!

Cam Nicholson began his career as a Livestock and Pastures Extension Officer, Department of Agriculture, Victoria and then began his own consulting business about 16 years ago, called Nicon Rural Services. The 2015 APEN Award for Excellence in Extension for an Experienced Professional has been presented for Cam's contribution to extension design, delivery and governance in the fields of livestock production, cropping and Natural Resource Management. An impressive aspect of Cam's work is the practical 'on the ground' elements, matched with the

APEN Treasurer's Report for 2014 - 2015

This report is based upon an audit of APEN's finances conducted by Bob Travers & Associates, Chartered Accountant, Albury, NSW.

The APEN financial position at June 30, 2015 was sound with total equity of \$89,975. During the year we received \$1,574 interest from our investments. There was an operating loss for the 2014/2015 financial year of \$4,357.

Tables 1 and 2 record the profit and loss situation and Table 3 records the Assets and Liability situation. In 2012-13 APEN took on the management of SELN fund (\$8,575) which are now included in APEN audited reports.

A healthy equity allows APEN:

- to provide free copies of Shaping Change to new members postage free and to other members at postage cost only
- to allow the Management Committee to meet more regularly to facilitate greater strategic planning
- to underwrite future conferences and cluster activities and
- to be able to offer tenders for the completion of tasks needed to keep APEN operating as a peak body.

As Treasurer I would like thank Rosemary Currie for her management of the organisation's finances.

APEN activities are also supported by many organisations who provide in-kind support by providing assistance such as meeting venue at no cost. The employers of management committee members also make significant contributions through staff time commitments and in some cases assistance with travel to APEN activities. Increasingly many management committee members operate their own businesses and the time commitments away from their business activities should also be recognised.

After six years I am stepping down as Treasurer and NSW coordinator in accordance with the APEN constitution. I would like to thank those APEN members who have served on the Management Committee over this time for their support and enthusiasm. I would like to acknowledge Jeanette for her leadership this year, taking on the role of President and also convening a highly successful conference.

Member Survey Key Points

Graham Harris, APEN Queensland Regional Coordinator

Every few years, we ask our members questions about themselves, their jobs, and how we can help and how we are doing.

Information on survey participants and their jobs:

- The response rate was 13%, with twothirds male and one third female
- There was a broad cross-section of respondents in terms of years of experience in extension – there was a greater proportion of female respondents in the younger age groups (25 to 45 years)
- Half of respondents had less than 10 years in extension
- There was a broad cross-section of employers represented by respondents

 38% from government, 24% from the private sector, 17% from industry and 11
 from academia
- Respondents identified a number of challenges they face as extension professionals – these included:
 - o A lack of recognition of extension as a profession
 - o Lack of available funding for extension activities
 - Lack of time to keep abreast of extension developments
 - o Remoteness hindering interaction with other extension professionals
 - o Changes in government policies towards providing extension services
 - o Resistance to change by research and extension professionals
- There were a range of training activities undertaken by the one-third of respondents in the past two years.

Information about member's experience with APEN

- There was strong satisfaction with APEN as a networking organisation, and a belief that it is well managed and effective
- There were several suggestions made in relation to improving APEN's effectiveness in addressing its goals:
 - o APEN more actively promote the value of good extension practice to R&D Corporations and governments, and at national peak body conferences
 - APEN assist extension practitioners identify measureable outcomes from their work
 - APEN expand the number of regional activities for members
 - o APEN use collaborative/social tools to strengthen networks
 - APEN provide an extension professional resource to assist individuals and groups
 - APEN continue providing professional development opportunities – webinars, videos, sharing of resources
 - APEN ramp up efforts in professional development
- The most used APEN services have been the APEN Bulletin, ExtensionNet and the APEN website. Webinars have also been popular
- APEN activities rated with high importance included networking, the APEN eBulletin, webinars and professional development and training opportunities
- 57% of respondents also provided training suggestions that APEN could assist with
- There was general satisfaction with the APEN Management Committee, although more information about the MC was requested and that more should be done to progress the extension profession

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APEN Supports the GGA Annual Forum Through the Small Grants Program

In August, APEN provided support to the Grower Group Alliance (GGA) Annual Forum through its Small Grants Program.

The GGA Annual Forum had themes that addressed APEN's core values of supporting the capacity and knowledge development of extension professionals. The grant particularly supported some of the travel costs of guest speaker and APEN member Neels Botha, AgResearch NZ.

Communication, collaboration and innovation were the big themes at the 2015 GGA Annual Forum

The 12th Annual Forum, 'Practice Change to Profit: Supporting Effective Grower Groups', demonstrated the important role that regionally based grower group's play in driving innovation, and focused on how groups could support research to be effectively extended into on-farm practice change and adoption.

Forum delegates heard firsthand how agriculture was not alone in its struggle of getting research out of the lab and into practice, with health professional and knowledge translation expert Tamika Heiden providing an insight into the world of knowledge translation and implementation science.

Tamika described how the field of knowledge translation took a lot of its initial inspiration and learnings from agricultural extension, highlighting that in the health sector it takes around 17 years to get a research into clinical practice.

"Tamika's presentation was enlightening, it really highlighted that some of the challenges that we face in agriculture are similar to those other industries are trying to tackle. What was even more fascinating was that the agricultural industry has been, at many times, the leader in this field," GGA Strategic Advisory Group Chair and Mingenew farmer, Clancy Michael said.

Neels Botha followed Tamika, presenting on extension frameworks in the New Zealand Dairy Industry, particularly focusing on business discussion groups as an extension tool to achieve on-farm adoption and improvements in productivity.

Wrapping up the day, networking specialist Robyn Henderson gave a dynamic presentation on how to develop meaningful connections and the importance of networks professionally and personally.

Robyn encouraged attendees to develop a systematic approach to networking and reiterated that personal networks can play a pivotal role in finding solutions to individual needs but also to those of peers.

The Annual Forum is GGA's premier event, but it is just one way the Alliance works to support regionally based grower groups and their communities to drive on farm innovation for a profitable and sustainable agricultural industry.

The GGA also supports grower groups by providing training, communication, project collaboration, and event and operational support, to ensure that groups can continue to deliver the most up-to-date and locally relevant information to their members.

The Grower Group Alliance is a non-profit, farmer driven organisation connecting grower groups, research organisations and agribusiness in a network across WA. The GGA is funded by DAFWA.

APEN Small Grants Program

The APEN Small Grants for Regional Events Program will provide grant funding and/or seed funding to assist individuals and organisations to access the initial funding required to organise and provide regional activities in line with APEN's objectives. A key goal of APEN is to foster professional development opportunities for people working in all areas of extension.

Applicants can apply for either small grant funds (<\$250) or seed funding (<\$1000).

Small grant funds will be provided without expectation of any funds being returned to APEN.

Seed funding will be provided with the expectation that these funds will be recouped, i.e seed funding and an agreed percentage of profits will be returned to APEN at completion of the event.

The APEN Management Committee will select projects that they believe will contribute to the development of the extension profession in Australia, New Zealand and the broader Australasia-Pacific region. In an endeavour to promote and foster novel and innovative projects there is no specific criteria for the program, other than projects must contribute to the professional development of people working in extension in a networking context.
