Importance of agricultural support services

- Developing countries
- Sri Lanka

Three decades of internal war





The development of smallholder farming influenced by the agricultural support services

Well-organized agricultural support system strengthen smallholder farmers' capabilities in farming

Contributes for recovery of agricultural sector and overall economic development





Little research – interactions between smallholder farmers and agricultural support service providers

Aim of the study:

To contribute to enhancing the provision of support services to smallholder farmers in post-war Northern Sri Lanka

Research Questions:

- 1. What agricultural support services are accessed by smallholder farmers in the post-war Northern Sri Lanka and why?
- 2. How are agricultural support service providers providing services to smallholder farmers in the post-war Northern Sri Lanka and why?






Provision of mix of services

Example – Milco and Private input traders








Preliminary findings.....

Interactions between service providers

- influence their relationship with farmers and
- how they are viewed by farmers







Link between service providers and farmers – gendered in nature

Post – war context – female farmers receive more services than male

Example – Dairy farmers receive more services than paddy farmers







Farmers' current expectations on service provision - their experience during war

Service provision during war

- regular visits to farmer's field by service providers
- duty of care
- farmer-centered services

Set a standard of service provision

Satisfied by private input traders











Theoretical contribution

- Advisory literature
- interaction between farmers and advisors
 - the network between advisors

Current study

 explores the agricultural support service system

Focuses on interactions between support service providers of which advice constitute a component of service for some providers and farmers in a post-war context





"The understandings from the study will be used to inform the support service providers and policy makers on how they can better assist the smallholder farmers to achieve development through agriculture in the region"
